

Do secondary movements influence the Czech position on refugee issues?

There are asylum seekers and refugees in the Czech Republic...



Asylum/refugee status + subsidiary protection



...and the asylum seekers and refugees move

- Secondary movements of asylum seekers / migrants
 - CR as a transit country (?)
 - secondary movements of relocated persons
- Secondary movements of recognized refugees
 - no statistics on movements of recognized refugees
 - secondary movements of resettled
- Secondary movements of people with subsidiary protection

Does the CR try to prevent secondary movements?

- Asylum seekers / migrants
 - asylum seekers
 - migrants ----) detention (+ alternatives to detention)

Refugees

- expectations communicated work with expectations as a tool to prevent secondary movement
- Interviews during the resettlement process, interviews before relocations
 - Help to keep the expectations realistic ...it seems to work
 - resettled stay (exception of private sponsorship cases)
 - relocated stay

The role of expectations

- confirmed by several studies
- "...differences among living standards, labour-market conditions and access to government support...
- "... presence of other migrants from their country of origin, the reputation of the destination, language and past colonial links..."

 mentioned in 2002 UNHCR roundtable ("their intentions ought to be taken into account") as part of the "effective solution"

The role of expectations...

- ...is underestimated.
 - asylum seekers and refugees expect
 - society expects

- Expectations from the EU legal framework as such?
 - discourse of permanent solution.
 - proposals in new drafts of regulations + reception directive --- effectiveness?

Czech public debates as a limit for consensus on EU level

- Debates about
 - ... about the number of people transiting through the Czech Republic in 2015/2016
 - ... about the number of people coming to the EU (countries)
 - ... on relocation decision ("no to quotas")
- ...on the permanent relocation scheme in the Dublin regulation draft ("no to quotas")
- (but consensus on many other provisions)

Conclusion

 Expectations should be taken into account – but also differenty then we are used to think of them

 Tools for crisis should not be the same as tools for small number of incomers
