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## BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Regulations (EU) 2019/817 and 2019/818 established the EU Interoperability framework with the objective of improving the effectiveness, efficiency and quality of information exchange between large-scale EU information systems in the areas of borders, migration, asylum, and security. The framework introduced shared components such as the European Search Portal (ESP), the Shared Biometric Matching Service (sBMS), the Common Identity Repository (CIR) and the Multiple-Identity Detector (MID), and requires close coordination between national authorities and eu-LISA.

While the technical architecture and responsibilities of eu-LISA are clearly defined at EU level, the Regulations leave flexibility to

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Member States regarding national governance arrangements for implementation, operation and coordination of interoperability components. In practice, Member States may assign these responsibilities to a single designated authority, distribute them across several bodies, or rely on temporary coordination structures during the implementation phase.

Clear national governance arrangements are considered essential to address the cross-cutting nature of interoperability, which touches upon policy coordination, IT system ownership, operational management, funding, cybersecurity, data protection, and cooperation with a wide range of national stakeholders (e.g. border management, asylum, consular services, law enforcement and judiciary). The designation of a national authority or coordination body may also support structured engagement with the European Commission and eu-LISA, monitoring and reporting obligations, and long-term sustainability of the interoperability framework.

Against this background, this ad hoc query aims to map how Member States have organised governance at national level for the implementation of Regulations (EU) 2019/817 and 2019/818, including the existence, mandate, institutional positioning, resources and duration of any designated national interoperability authority or body, as well as future plans where such arrangements are not yet in place.
